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

One of the most challenging elements in working in local government is communication. And

when I talk about communication, I am talking about communication in both directions. From the Town Administration and Council to our residents, and also from our residents to the Administration and Council. Even as I write this, I am wondering just how many or how few residents will be reading this article.

To communicate to the residents, we have the monthly newsletter, the email blasts, (which you can sign up for on our website) the roadway message boards, as well as normal email and phone conversations. And yet, it is still not unusual for me to be in a conversation with a resident and hear that they were unaware of an event or service, or an upcoming change. It is no one's fault. The Town is sincerely attempting to communicate in every way possible and all of us as residents have busy lives with a lot going on. However, I am open to more recommendations because it truly is a challenge.

On the other hand, there is the communication from the residents to the Council and Administration. Our contact information is out there. I publish my personal phone number (954-296-6018) often as well as my SWR phone number (954-343-7462). Then of course, there is my email, sbreitkreuz@southwestranches.org. (Sorry for the long last name!) The other Council Members have their contact information on the last page of the Newsletter as well. We want to hear from you! My goal is to represent you as fairly as possible, and I can only do this if I understand your concerns and hear about the areas that you wish to improve. So, I welcome your feedback.

There is another commonly used tool for communication that I want to touch on. That tool is Facebook. Honestly, I was not on Facebook until I was in Town office, and I joined simply because I knew that it was an important tool for me to monitor to hear and understand what is going on in Town, either good or bad. So, I want you to know that I do monitor Facebook and if there is something in particular you want to be sure I see, I encourage you to specifically tag me.

However, I do want you to know that in most cases I will not respond on Facebook with a comment at

large. There are a couple of reasons for this. First, many of the topics that are discussed are topics that will come before the Council in the future and for me to respond, would open up both me and the resident to Florida Sunshine Laws violations. So, I am very cautious about that. The second reason is that some of the topics are complex, and cannot be expressed in 2 or 3 sentences or even a paragraph. Often, my response on Facebook would be incomplete and only create more misinformation.

But I want to hear from you, and I want to respond. If you have an issue, please feel free to call me or send me an email. If you would rather express it to a wider audience, we have public comment at our Council Meetings (generally the second and fourth Thursdays of each month), where I provide whatever time is required for residents to express their concerns and in that forum, on the record. I make it a point to fully respond to you. Because this communication is critical and I very much want to hear your concerns.

My hope is that you will become more actively engaged in our Town by opening up new lines of communication. Through more interactive communication, I believe that we will continue to ensure that the priorities of the Council reflect the priorities of the residents.

Thank-you as always for the opportunity to serve our Town as your Mayor. Please feel free to contact me should you have any concerns or recommendations for improvements.

Mayor this year. The Carnival was a great event that everyone seemed to enjoy. The farmers' market is going strong and will be here for several more months.

I hope that most of you have seen the new Traffic Control Speed Signs around Town. The Town is moving the signs to try and cover all the hot spots where speeding is a problem. If you have an idea as to where you think the signs should be placed, please reach out to me through my email or by calling me direct. The more place these signs are spotted along our streets, the more aware the drivers will become of their driving habits.

Our new waste collection company has shown a marked improvement over the previous company. I know that new collection maps are being drawn up and Town Hall has launched a new page on the Town's Website where you can look up your exact collection dates for garbage, recycling and bulk by simply entering your address. Hopefully this will help to eliminate some of the confusion about collection dates.

The District 3 civic association is working hard to get formalized with the state, and by doing so they will join Sunshine Ranches, Rolling Oaks and Country Estates as a voice for their community. The District 3 boundaries extend from Volunteer Road west to 172nd Avenue. The Ivanhoe Estates community, just south of the Publix shopping center, is part of the Town's District 3 along with most of Deems Ranches. The meeting is usually set for the last Monday of the month

I am happy to announce that most of the drainage work currently being done in Green Meadows is

finishing up, however there is future work being planned. The Town staff will have a meeting with the residents affected before any of the work is started. Please look through your Town newsletter that comes every month, there is a lot of information about upcoming work projects, special community activities, garbage and bulk pick updates and all kinds of Town contests and activities that are fun for the whole community.

2022 was a very good year for the Town. With the hard-working efforts of our Town Staff, State and Federal elected officials, money came in from the State and Federal Government that helped several projects to be completed without any Town money being spent. The Town lowered our millage rate, adopted the Charter Review amendments, revised our Park fees, installed guardrails, installed LPR cameras around Town, and made improvements to all our parks. Howdy Folks,

I want to begin by

wishing everyone a Happy February. I'm using this month's article to update you on Town concerns.

Recently, there has been an increase in reports of casualties related to coyote attacks. While every Council Member shares the concerns of coyotes, I believe that we need to investigate how to control them. Not too long ago, we had a presentation on coyotes in our Town, and I was concerned being advised that since coyotes are pack animals, keeping the pack functioning is a primary cause. We were told that if we eliminate one or two, the pack perceives this as a threat and causes the pack to populate with more young. For us this means we have basically one option: a complete eradication. Where I see a concern is the protection of private property rights. Whatever the solution, it must be a complete Town-wide effort.

Over the past month, several residents have contacted me about the idea of a financial benefit in the form of a rebate for folks with barns for their animals if they are not already classified as AG by the property appraiser. Since I made it my agenda to Keep It Rural, I will see this concept through this budget year. Preliminary discussions are heading in the direction of a process to apply for the grant or credit. We all see this as a great way to Keep It Rural by rewarding our residents who maintain horses and farm animals as a non-business, non-AG hobby. Please follow this issue if you believe you may qualify.

In closing, I wish you a safe and successful 2023.

Hi Neighbors,

In last month's

Southwest Rancher, I mentioned that we have coordinated visits to WM's Reuter Transfer Station recycling facility, located east at 20701 Pembroke Rd, off US 27, in February and again in March. All recycling from SWR goes to this facility. It processes approximately 100 tons of potential recycling materials daily. The facility is fascinating, and I encourage you to visit if you're available. I found it remarkably interesting as I learned more about properly recycling and how the recycling industry is picking up, so more of our pre-used materials are finding new uses. You will also learn why putting grocery store bags and pizza boxes in your recycling bin is a terrible idea.

WM offers facility tours to you on two dates: 10 a.m. on Saturday, February 18th, and 10 a.m. on Thursday, March 9th. WM extends this invitation to residents 14 years and older; the tour requires climbing steep stairs and standing on platforms high above the various waste processing streams. You will follow the process from where trucks dump their loads through staging the finished recycled materials for transfer to WM's recycle resource customers. After your tour, there is a Q&A session to discuss the facility and your questions.

These tours are each limited to 15 people. If you would like to attend either 1-hour tour, please get in touch with me as soon as possible since space is limited. If you are interested in joining us, please email me (BHartmann@southwestranches.org) your name, phone number, the date you would like to attend, and the number of attendees planning to join us.

December 2022 Special Session: Property Insurance Reform

The Florida
Legislature made
another attempt to
address Florida's
property insurance
crisis during a
Special Session
this past
December. Many
constituents have
been asking
important

questions about this.

"What does this mean for us homeowners? Should we expect insurance premium relief?

And if so by what percentage?"

The sponsor of the bill was asked this same question on the floor, and he stated clearly that this legislation was to stabilize the market, and that "hopefully in the future there may be a rate reduction." In my opinion, this was not a consumer-friendly bill and many of my colleagues' brought amendments to the floor specifically addressing rate reduction and freezes; however, these amendments failed.

SB 2-A, Property Insurance:

- The bill creates the Florida Optional Reinsurance Assistance (FORA) program in which property insurers may participate
- · Prohibits assignment of benefits
- Eliminates "one-way attorney fees"
- Establishes a requirement to show a breach of the insurance contract before a homeowner may bring a bad faith action against an insurance company
- Reduces the time for a homeowner to report a claim to an insurance company and reduces the time for insurance companies to process a claim
- Property insurers may be subject to an additional market conduct examination by the Office of Insurance Regulation (OIR) post-hurricane.
- · Depopulates Citizens.
- Requires Citizens policyholders to purchase a separate flood insurance policy

I did support the legislation we passed in May, and it has already reduced litigation by 30% and if your insurance company utilized the \$2 billion Reinsurance Assistance Program established in the May bill, there was a mandate that savings be passed on to the customer.

This new bill allocates an additional \$1 billion of our tax

dollars to the Reinsurance Assistance Program without the provision to pass savings on to consumers and in my opinion without safeguards. Reinsurance is insurance for the insurance company. Private market insurance companies must purchase it and about 49% of your premium is for their reinsurance costs. This was an important step to stabilize the market and keep insurers in Florida.

We all pay an excessive amount of money to protect our greatest asset and if something happens to our home, we want our insurance to work. In my opinion, some provisions in the bill addressing excessive litigation go too far and may hurt the consumer and their access to the Courts.

This bill DOES eliminate Assignment of Benefits, which in my opinion, is a good measure to eliminate fraud.

This bill will also allow your insurance company to offer you the option to buy a policy with a binding arbitration provision for a reduction in your rate. I encourage all to research this issue to ensure you are making an informed decision.

Binding arbitration refers to a legal award having a legal binding status. If a claim is in dispute, you and the insurance company will present your cases to an arbitrator who will decide if you receive the award and how much you will be paid based on the evidence presented. You cannot appeal or access the courts once the decision is made.

It is important to note that you may have to pay for your own attorney and experts out of pocket if you choose this option. The insurance company has hundreds of lawyers and experts on stand-by for their case. It may be difficult to find an attorney to work on contingency for smaller claims. There are no attorney fees awarded so those costs are paid up front by you or are paid by the award money you may receive, which may not be enough to cover your repairs and pay your legal bills (if you have a mortgage, the bank will verify that you completed the repairs). At times, Florida law is not applied to your arbitration (it could be New York law or the law where the company is based) and arbitration may have to physically occur in another state. In my opinion, a provision outlining the parameters of arbitration could be added to the statute in the future, as a simple fix to this situation.

The biggest changes come to those enrolled in Citizens Property Insurance. The bill depopulates Citizens which was intended to be an insurance of last resort as described by the bill sponsor. When it's time for you to renew your policy, if a private insurance company offers you a similar policy that costs up to 20% more money – you will HAVE to take this policy and pay the new premium; you will be removed from Citizens.

You will also HAVE to buy flood insurance if you have a Citizens policy. There is a phase in period, but you will eventually have to buy it, even if you do NOT live in a flood zone

I co-sponsored HB 9-A, Insurance, which was never heard by the House.

- Establishes a Property Insurance Commission
- Makes the Commissioner of the OIR an elected versus Governor appointed position to ensure this individual is accountable to the voters of Florida
- Makes homeowners not located with a "wind-borne debris region" eligible for grants under the "My Safe Florida Home Program" and increases funding for that program
- Requires that any interest earned on insurance proceeds received by a mortgage company be paid to the insured
- Prohibits an insurance company from claiming it is insolvent in Florida if it still writes business elsewhere
- Requires that companies that offer property insurance elsewhere, but not in Florida, should be prohibited from only offering other types of insurance in Florida.
- Requires an insurer to release to an insured all information related to an inspection or an underwriting report upon request
- Prohibits an insurance company from denying a claim based on the property's pre-loss condition or faulty installation or workmanship
- Requires strengthening the Department of Financial Services Mediation Program
- Requires that each time there is legislation to reform property insurance, OIR must require insurers to offer homeowners premium rate reductions

We will be revisiting insurance during regular session where I hope we can collaborate and create a bill that will continue to stabilize the market, protect consumers and reduce premiums. I welcome ideas and suggestions. I know there will be a myriad of opinions, and I am open to hearing them all.


It has been noted throughout our Town that some flags are worn out and need to be replaced. Let's keep the tradition going and keep Old Glory looking good.

Exemption Amount Increase for Widows, Widowers, Blind Persons and Persons Totally and Permanently Disabled

Thousands of Broward County property owners qualify for these exemptions. Under previous law, these exemptions deducted only \$500 from the property's assessed value which equates to an annual savings of only \$10 in property taxes. Representative Michael Gottlieb and Senator Ana Maria Rodriguez secured language in the 2022 legislative session which increased this exemption amount to \$5,000 for an increased tax savings of approximately \$100 beginning in 2023.

Automatic Senior Exemption Renewals for 2023

After the initial application approval, the Low-Income Senior Exemption automatically renews each year unless the senior notifies our office that they no longer meet the income requirement for this exemption. People who received the Senior Exemption in 2022 and are still living at the same address do not need to send in a signed renewal card to continue receiving this exemption.

Our office will mail the Senior Exemption renewal information this month with the annual income limitation set by the state of Florida.

- If your 2022 adjusted household gross income does not exceed the income limitation, you DO NOT need to do anything to continue receiving this valuable exemption for 2023. Your exemption will automatically be renewed provided you are still living at the same address and receiving Homestead Exemption.
- If your 2022 adjusted household gross income <u>did</u> exceed the income limitation, you must notify our office that you no longer qualify for this tax year when you receive the annual income notification from our office. We understand the adjusted household gross income for some individuals may change from year to year so an applicant may qualify one year and then not the next.

If you did not receive the Senior Exemption for 2022 and you believe you may qualify, please visit our website at web.bcpa.net and click on the "Senior Exemption" icon to view this exemption. You can also apply online at https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/SeniorsAppForm. The absolute deadline to apply for any 2023 exemption is September 18, 2023.

PROTOTYPE BARN

In furtherance of the Town's goal of preserving its rural lifestyle, the Town Council has given residents a simpler mechanism to build a barn that is in compliance with Florida statutory requirements. As such, the Town contracted with an architect who agreed to create a prototype barn drawing in compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be performed.

drawing, in compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be permitted for residents throughout the Town. The plans are for a three stall barn with a tack room.

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
