Mayor's Message

Probably the three most common issues that residents bring to me are Traffic, Mail Theft, and Party Noise.

I will touch on each of those briefly.

First, Traffic: Traffic is always a concern. My goal is to get greater compliance, especially in the interior of our Town, meaning the internal residential roads. Traffic tickets are probably the most effective tool, but there is a common misconception that this is a money maker for the Town. It is not. The Town gets a very small portion of the fine and the revenue does not come near what it takes to have the police presence in the area. However, if it helps bring compliance, it is worth it. We have another very effective tool at our disposal now. It is a speed trailer that flashes to indicate that drivers are speeding. If you are concerned about speeding on your road, please contact me or contact the Town and request the speed trailer. It is a great tool for reducing speeding.

Second, Mail Theft: We had a significant spike in mail theft in the Green Meadows portion of Town, but Davie PD did an exceptional job in tracking down and catching the offenders. It still happens but it has now become a more significant issue in Sunshine Ranches. I know that Davie PD is focused on catching those offenders as well. In the meantime, I want to offer three recommendations that you can do to protect yourself.

First, get in the habit of getting your incoming mail out of your mailbox before sundown. The vast majority of the thefts are done at night. Let's not give then anything to steal. Second, don't place anything worth stealing in your outgoing mailbox. If you have anything such as a check to mail, drop it in the postal drop box either at Town Hall or at your closest Post Office. Finally, sign up for the Post Office "Informed Delivery." In the morning, at about 8:00 AM, it will show you an image of everything that is going to be delivered to you that day. So, you will know if something is missing. You can go to the Post Office main webpage and the "Informed Delivery" selection is that the very top of the webpage. Select that and sign up.

Third, Party Noise: The challenge here is that it is difficult for Davie PD to regulate, but they are doing their best and residents are being issued code violations for excessive noise. Having now spoken with MANY residents on this issue, I think that it is time to revisit this ordinance again, and I will be doing that. Please forward to me any recommendations that you might have. The best way is to forward them to my email, sbreitkreuz@southwestranches.org. Unfortunately, what we have in place today is simply not working. In the meantime, if you are having a party, please respect your neighbors. Enjoy your party have fun and celebrate but keep your music to a level that will not disturb your neighbors. They also want to enjoy their weekend and most residents I speak to are able to do that by enjoying the peace quiet that is the Southwest Ranches rural lifestyle. So please respect your neighbors' right to do just that.

Finally, just a quick note that I will be pausing my monthly Mayor phone calls for the summer. Enjoy your summer and I will forward out information when we are ready to restart the calls.

Thank-you as always for the opportunity to serve our Town as your Mayor. It is truly an honor.





STAY IN TOUCH WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

Howdy Ranchers,

The month of May brings us Mother's Day on the 14th when

we honor the mother of our families. Remember to give your mother a gift, send a card, take her out for dinner or buy her some nice flowers to show her how special she is to you.

Over the past few months, many of our neighbors have been under an onslaught of mail thefts. I took this as a personal attack against one of the freedoms that we treasure by living in this special small Town. I pressured administration to further pressure law enforcement to increase surveillance. Last month in a dramatic full presence, our law enforcement apprehended a suspect. The capture involved a late-night high-speed chase, crashing the suspect's vehicle in a canal, running away from the scene, releasing the Davie police K9 unit and even spotlighting from a Broward Sheriff's Helicopter. As of this writing no mail thefts have been reported. I must reiterate, if you are a victim, you must make a report. Without a report, it is as if the crime never happened. As your lawand-order Council Member, this apprehension is good news.

On another note: Attending homeowners associations helps me get the ambiance of the neighbors. One issue that has come up concerns parties. Our Town has required homeowners to obtain a permit to hold a party or a "Special Event" and has required so for quite a while. The Town categorizes residential special events as residential gatherings, and wayside stands.

A residential gathering permit is required anytime there is a gathering of 30 people or more, there is an expectation of loud noise, or any impact to the neighborhood such as high traffic or temporary structures. Examples of gatherings include birthday celebrations, graduation celebrations, Bar/Bat Mitzvahs, weddings, religious gatherings, political meetings, and nonprofit fundraisers to name a few. These types of events cannot be open to the public and cannot charge an entrance fee. Let me reiterate, a "forprofit" gathering with an entrance fee is strictly prohibited.

The other category is called wayside stands. This type of event is generally for commercial sales related to Holidays such as Independence Day, Halloween and Christmas. Any site that is proposing the sale of items related to the Holidays must obtain approval from the Town and provide all the proper documentation, such as licensing and insurances to obtain a permit. Finally, regardless of the type of residential gathering, all noise must be turned off at 11:00 pm, and if the music is unreasonably loud, call Davie Police. Nothing can be done without a police report. Most of the time, the host will agree to lower the music. If you are the host, an invitation to your neighbors may diminish the likelihood of a report.

As your Town Council Member, I aim to preserve Southwest Ranches' unique rural lifestyle and to minimize any changes to it. Together, let's protect and maintain what makes our community special.

May is a special month because we celebrate important holidays such as Mother's Day and Memorial Day. May is also an opportunity to focus on first responders and other integral members of our local communities.

HB 101 and CS/CS/HB 239

Each year on May 4th, the world observes International Firefighters Day. At noon local time on the first Sunday in May, around the world, fire sirens sound for 30 seconds followed by a minute of silence in memory of past firefighters who sacrificed their lives in the line of duty in service to their communities.

May 11th – 15th is known as Police Week. This nation-wide event is dedicated to honoring America's law enforcement officers who have also lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others.

Firefighters, police, and other first responders dedicate their lives to the protection and safety of our communities. In my capacity as a legislator, it is important for me to honor all of these professionals for their critical sacrifices.

Last session, I co-sponsored a bill that provided a full exemption from property taxes for first responders who are totally and permanently disabled as a result of an injury sustained in the line of duty. This exemption also carries over to the surviving spouse of the first responder. This session, I am proud to co-sponsor HB 101, Homestead Exemption for First Responders, filed by Representative Woodson. This legislation revises the definition of "first responder" to include federal law enforcement officers. This revision came about after two brave FBI agents were killed in the line of duty; their spouses deserve the same benefits.

This Session, I co-sponsored CS/CS/HB 239, Florida Retirement System, which passed the House Floor. It restores the pre-2011 normal retirement age and years of service for Special Risk Class members (age 55 or age 52 after completing 25 years of creditable service). This bill also restores the pre-2011 cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for eligible FRS Pension Plan members to 3%. This bill will be headed to the Governor's desk.

HB 271

National Teacher Appreciation Day is Tuesday of the first full week in May. HB 271, the "Save Our Teachers Act" filed by Representative Edmonds, aims to raise the minimum base salary for all teachers in Florida from \$47,500 per year to at least \$65,000 per year. As a former teacher and mother of a teacher, I felt duty-bound to co-sponsor this bill because I know firsthand that it is critical we fairly compensate teachers, who give so much to the students in our communities, so that those professionals may afford to live in Florida. Unfortunately, this bill was not heard and we will need to try again next year. I will continue to support and fight to ensure that teachers get a living wage.

CS/HB 635

According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), only 15% of veterans are eligible to access dental services through the VA system.

For the remaining 85% who are ineligible, they typically receive dental care through employersponsored insurance, the Federal Dental and Vision Insurance Program provided by the VA, or self-pay. Unfortunately, 41% of veterans rated their oral health as either "fair" or "poor" in the National Survey of Veterans.

In honor of Military Appreciation Month in May and the large community of veterans in South Florida, I am proud to co-sponsor HB 635, Dental Service for Veterans, filed by Representative Maney. This bill creates the Dental Service for Veterans Program to provide veterans with access to routine dental care. The bill directs the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs to contract with a statewide direct-support organization to administer the program, which will in turn distribute grants to eligible nonprofits that have experience in providing dental care to veterans. Veterans will receive the treatment they deserve for their sacrifices. This legislation is headed to the House Floor.

My sincerest gratitude to current and past first responders, teachers, and military personnel for all your contributions to our community!

Springtime is Baby Animal Time: Mammals

(As adapted from The Humane Society of the United States)

It is common to see baby wild animals outside during spring, as a new generation makes its way into the world. Baby wild animals might seem like they need our help, but unless the animal is truly orphaned or injured, there is no need to rescue them. These tips can help you decide whether to act. If you see any of these signs, find help for the animal. If necessary, safely capture and transport them to the appropriate place for treatment.

- The animal is brought to you by a cat or dog.
- There's evidence of bleeding.
- The animal has an apparent or obvious broken limb.
- A bird is featherless or featherless and on the ground.
- The animal is shivering.
- There is a dead parent nearby.
- The animal is crying and wandering all day long.

If you see any of these signs, find help for the animal. If necessary, safely capture and transport them to the appropriate place for treatment.



A squirrel who is full-sized, has a full and fluffy tail and can run, jump and climb is independent. However, if a juvenile squirrel continuously approaches and follows people, their mom is gone. In this case, you should contact a rehabilitator because the baby is very hungry and needs care. There are a few cases where you might need to intervene: 1) a baby squirrel falls from a nest; 2) a nest falls from a tree; a felled tree contains an intact nest. If the baby and/or their nest fell from the tree today, give the mother squirrel a chance to reclaim their young and relocate them to a new nest. If the baby is uninjured, leave them where they are, leave the area, keep people and pets away and monitor them from a safe distance. If it is chilly outside or the baby is not fully furred, place them in a shoe-



box with something warm underneath (like a heating pad on a low setting or a hot water bottle). Be sure to put a flannel shirt between the baby and the heating device, or they could overheat. Do not cover them with anything or the mother might not be able to find them. If the babies are not retrieved by dusk, take these steps: 1) wearing thick gloves, gather the squirrels and place them inside a thick, soft cloth, such as a cloth diaper or fleece scarf or hat; 2)

place one of the following items beneath the cloth: A chemical hand warmer inside a sock, a hot water bottle (replace the hot water every 30 minutes) or a heating pad set on the lowest setting. (If the heating pad has no cover, put it inside two pillowcases so the babies do not overheat.); 3) place the baby squirrels, cloth and warmer inside a small cardboard box or carrier. Call a wildlife rehabilitator.



Baby opossums are born as embryos, barely larger than a bee, and spend about two months nursing in their mother's pouch. When they get to be about three to four inches long and start riding around on their mother's

back, they may fall off without the mother noticing. As a rule, if an opossum is over seven inches long (not including the tail), they are old enough to be on their own. If they're less than seven inches long (not including the tail), they are orphaned and you should contact a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.





If a baby raccoon has been alone for more than a few hours, they are an orphan. Mother raccoons don't let their young out of their sight for long. Put an inverted laundry basket over the baby (with a light weight on top so



they cannot push their way out) and monitor them until well into the nighttime hours (raccoons are nocturnal, so the mom should come out at night to reclaim her baby). You can also put the cub in a pet carrier and close the door. Instead of latching it, prop it closed with an angled stick. When the mother returns, she will run in front of the

carrier, push over the stick and the door will pop open. If the mother does not return, contact a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. In spring and summer, people often set traps in a misguided effort to resolve garbage and other "nuisance" issues. Unfortunately, this approach leads to trapped and killed mothers who leave their starving young behind. If anyone in your neighborhood is setting traps, persuade them to use more humane and effective methods instead.

"HOW TO DO BUSINESS WITH THE TOWN" FROM FINANCE & BUDGET

The Town welcomes participation from all vendors qualified to do business with the Town. The Procurement page on the Town's website explains the steps for completing a Vendor Application.

Below are the processes used by the Town when soliciting goods and services.

QUOTES

An informal competitive process which solicits pricing information from several sources that does not require a formal sealed bid or proposal, public opening, or other legal formalities.



BIDS

All goods or services above \$25,000 must be competitively bid as per the Town procurement policy (ORD 2022-005). All bid meetings are open to the public and posted on the Town's website.

Town of Southwest Ranches purchasing thresholds and authority levels are below:

AMOUNT	AUTHORITY	
LEVEL 1:	Department Head	
Less than \$1,000	No quotations are required.	
LEVEL 2:	Department Head and written	
Equal to or greater than <u>\$1,000</u>	approval by Town Administrator

• **Do not walk through flowing water.** If you must walk in standing water, use a pole or stick to ensure the depth of the water ahead.

• Do not drive through a flooded area. Do not drive around road barriers; the road may be washed out.

• **Stay away from power lines and electrical wires.** Electrical current travels through water. If possible, report downed powerlines to FPL. Do not use appliances or motors that are wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.

• Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their habitat may take shelter in your home.

• *Look before you step.* After a flood, the ground and floors can be covered with debris. Surfaces that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.

• **Be alert for gas leaks.** If your house is serviced by gas, do not smoke, use candles or open flames unless you know the gas has not built up. Make arrangements to turn off your electricity and gas.

Financial Assistance Advice

If your home or business is damaged by a flood, you may be required to meet certain building requirements to reduce further flood damage by coming into compliance with local, state, and federal criteria. To help with these cial assistance such as grants loans, rehates and the NEIP's lograged Cost of

costs, financial assistance such as grants, loans, rebates and the NFIP's Increased Cost of Compliance Coverage may be available.

National Flood Insurance Program Changes



In accordance with 2014 Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is continuing to gradually phase out flood insurance premium subsidies on certain policyholders. The

changes have and will have the greatest impact on properties located within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) that were built prior to the adoption of Broward County's first FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) on October 26, 1972, or prior to December 31, 1974, without elevation certificate information. Get a Flood Insurance Policy

Replacing household contents damaged by floods could place a significant financial burden on a homeowner or renter without flood insurance. Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.

Homeowner's insurance policies do not generally cover damage from floods. However, because the Town of Southwest Ranches participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy from an insurance agent and benefit from the premium discount available to all Southwest Ranches residents. Flood insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that have been flooded previously. Please note that unless there is a special condition of the mortgage, there normally is a 30-day waiting period between the time flood insurance is purchased and the time coverage is in force. Though all home and business owners in these areas with mortgages from federally regulated or insured lenders are required to buy flood insurance, all residents should consider flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses.



If your property is in the SFHA and you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or insured lender, flood insurance is required. Even if you do not have a mortgage and you live in the SFHA or you live outside of the SFHA, all property owners and renters should carefully consider the benefits of flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses from floods. Water Quality and Flood Control Effects of **Drainage Systems**

The success of the drainage system in your neighborhood depends on proper maintenance of the system. The swales that are commonly located between your yard and street are part of the neighborhood's storm water management system.

Gutters, storm drain pipes, lakes, wetlands, swales and canals should be kept free of debris. It is against Town Code to dump trash in waters. The drainage system may provide both water quality and flood control benefits. Lakes, wetlands, swales and canals filter pollutants from runoff or allow pollutants to settle out. Check with the Town's Engineering Department before paving, regrading or altering swales.



Protect Property from Flooding

Losses due to floods can be reduced by implementing property protection measures. Furniture, appliances, clothing, and other movable items can be elevated within the structure or relocated away from potential flooding if time permits. You should also make an itemized inventory of your belongings including costs, dates of purchase and serial numbers.

There are several ways to protect a building from flood damage if feasible. One way is to make sure your lot is graded in a manner that will direct runoff away from your building. Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended if water will rise to a depth of two feet or greater. A third approach is to raise the house above flood levels. Prior to making these modifications, consult with a certified contractor.



Build Responsibly

Strict regulations govern substantial improvements to structures in the flood plain. According to NFIP, "substantial improvement" means the cost of any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either before the improvement is started or if the structure has been damaged and is being restored.

Please be advised that any new development or improvement on a property will be subject to current Town regulations and may also be subject to state and federal regulations. Please contact the Southwest Ranches Building Code Services Division at (954) 434-0008 for specific information and to report unpermitted construction activities.



Flood Risk Specialist Available to Assist Residents

The Town of Southwest Ranches wants to ensure that residents who have questions about flood risks, flood insurance, and retrofitting techniques, get answers in a timely manner. The Town Engineer is available to assist in the following areas: 1) Flood Insurance; 2) Flood Zone interpretation including base flood elevation and/or flood depth; 3) Additional FIRM information; 4) Problems not shown on FIRM; 5) Special flood related hazards; 6) Historical flood-related data; 7) Natural floodplain functions; and 8) Property protection measures. and ask to speak to the Town Engineer. You may also schedule a site visit to review flooding, drainage, and storm sewer problems, and to obtain advice on retrofitting techniques to provide additional protection. Local Flood Hazards



Floods resulting from prolonged, heavy rainfall can occur in rivers and canals that drain inland areas into the Atlantic Ocean when waterway capacities are exceeded. Flooding from heavy rainfall occurs in low-lying areas and areas near rivers and canals.

The severe flooding that occurred as a result of the exceedingly wet summers and the hurricanes of 1947 was the basis for creating what is now the South Florida Water Management District. South Florida's five-month rainy season brings more than two-thirds of the region's annual rainfall. The rainy season can also bring flooding, which may occur when large amounts of rain fall over a short period of time or from a single heavy storm, tropical system or hurricane.



Since portions of Southwest Ranches have been designated as a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), it is advisable to check the interactive map viewer to see the location of your property with respect to the SFHA. Visit http://southwestranches. org/departments/town-engineering/flood-insurance-information/ and se-

lect Flood Maps. You can also call (954) 434-0008, provide your address and zip code, and Town staff will assist you in determining SFHA information specific to your property.

Protect Natural Floodplain Functions

Although much of the natural flood plain system in South Florida has been altered and is frequently over-drained, efforts are being made to enhance many historical wetlands and canals to restore them to a more natural state. These flood plain and wetland areas buffer flood flows, remove pollutants from our surface waters, recharge groundwater and create diverse habitat systems for plants and animals. The Southwest Ranches Comprehensive Plan includes policies pertaining to flood plains and wetlands. The plan provides for protection and creation of surface waters, protection and wetlands preservation.

Map Services

Maps are an effective method of communicating information about flood hazards. Residents and businesses that are aware of potential flood hazards can take steps to avoid problems and reduce exposure to flooding. Therefore, the Town offers complementary maps to supplement and clarify the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with information on additional hazards, flooding outside mapped areas, development regulations that affect floodplain properties, flood insurance, natural floodplain functions, and property protection measures.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes information you will need for a flood insurance policy including whether your property is in a SFHA, the community number, panel number and suffix, FIRM date, FIRM zone, base flood elevation and the elevation datum used. Additional FIRM information is also available showing areas of concern such as whether your property is located within a floodway.

The Town has mapped local drainage problem areas within the Town. In addition, the Town has a map providing information about past floods that have occurred. If you live in one of these areas, we would like to have a discussion with you regarding potential remedies.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes layers related to natural floodplain functions, specifically wetlands and fish and wildlife habitat. The map includes Broward County's wetland data to provide a comprehensive picture of where wetlands are located within the Town.

Copies of Deeds are Public Records and Free

Every year our office hears of new mailings aimed at Broward County property owners offering to provide the owner with a "certified deed" for their property. The company will provide this service for a fee; however, most documents are available for free through Broward County Records Division.

Your deed is a document or written legal instrument which, when executed and delivered, conveys an interest in or legal title to a property. Deed recordation is the process of registering a transfer of real property with the Broward County Records, Taxes & Treasury Division. Once the deed is recorded with County Records, it is provided to the Property Appraiser's Office so the property record can be updated. If a property owner is registered with our Owner Alert notification service, the owner will receive an email notification of this change. Property owners can register for the Owner Alert notification service online at https://web.bcpa.net/owneralert

Deeds and many other important documents are already available online and free on Broward County's Records, Taxes & Treasury Division's website and linked from our office's website. Deeds recorded prior to January 1, 1978 and recorded deeds utilizing social security numbers must be ordered in person or by written request. The county charges a nominal fee for reproduction (\$1.00 a page(\$2.00 certified) along with a \$2.00 search fee per name, per year. County Records can be reached at 954-831-4000.

Reviewing and obtaining a copy of your deed on County Records website is simple: go to https://officialrecords.broward.org/AcclaimWeb and select your search criteria. Documents matching these criteria will be displayed and you can print a copy of the document you select. To search for a recorded deed on the our website, search for the property record at https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/Record-Search and click on the blue "Book/Page or CIN" number located under the "Sales History for this Parcel" on the property record page.

MAINTAIN YOUR SWALE

In Southwest Ranches, swales can be found along the front of your property and are there to contain water runoff. The centerline of the swale is typically 12 inches below the edge of pavement. This ensures that the roads are clear after a rain event.

Do not fill them in or plant in these areas. The swale should be clear of all obstructions in order to work efficiently. You should keep your

swale well-mowed and free of litter and debris so water can flow freely. Check swales periodically for both erosion or natural build-up of sediments. If water collects in the swale, leave it alone - it means the system is working!

A swale is one of the most common type of stormwater best management practice (BMP). Swales not only convey stormwater but also help to treat runoff by reducing nutrient loading. Because swales have a wide and relatively flat profile, rainwater collected within them is slowed significantly. The reduction in the velocity of the runoff promotes temporary ponding. Reducing the water's speed allows for suspended solids such as heavy metals, eroded soil particles, and other pollutants to settle and filter into the swale's vegetation cover. Stormwater staging in the swale allows the water to percolate into the soil, helping to reduce the volume and amount of pollutants transported downstream. The pollutant reduction will improve the water quality in surrounding water bodies.



MAINTAIN YOUR SWALE

- . Mow the swale.
- Remove and then compost leaves and grass clippings.
- Keep good grass growth.
- Minimize use of fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides.
- Aerate soils to restore percolation rate.
- · Inspect for erosion. Any damaged sod should be replaced immediately.

DO NOT MISUSE YOUR SWALE

- Do not pile garbage, trash, leaves, limbs or debris in swales this adds pollutants, which can wash into downstream waters.
- Do not park vehicles in the swale this compacts the soil so less runoff is absorbed.
- Do not plant trees or shrubs or place obstructions within the swale.

LET THE WATER POND

Runoff should temporarily pond in the swale for up to 72 hours.
