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

As we celebrate this day, let's also give thanks for those that have made the ultimate sacrifice so that we can enjoy these freedoms.

One of the topics that I am hearing more and more about is the disruption caused by noise, generally loud parties. In May of this year, I called for a special workshop so that I could hear directly from our residents about what they felt was good with the current ordinance and what needed to be fixed. I was pleased that we had a good number of individuals attend and I also received more feedback via email.

Clearly there are two sides to the issue. On the one hand, we should all be able to enjoy the quite enjoyment in our own homes. On the other hand, life is also all about celebrating those special events in our lives and in the lives of those that we love. So, that is the balancing act. Both are VERY legitimate points of view. There are no good or bad guys here, we just need to determine the middle ground that will adequately accommodate both of these views.

Out of the workshop, a heard several great recommendations. I am going to list them below. The reason why I am listing them is to continue to get your feedback. Please DO NOT take these as the final word. They are not. They are ideas that I believe merit consideration.

- I) Use SaferWatch: great way to report non-emergencies.
- 2) It's a violation if it can be heard inside the reporting party's house.
- 3) Exception would be by permit:
- a. Mostly daylight hours on weekends and holidays.
- b. Reduced number of permits a year from the current six (6).

- c. I definitely want to hear your feedback on this: Too much or too little?
- 4) There would be exemptions such as animals, construction, and maintenance etc.
- 5) Vacation Rentals (These have become some of our worst repeat offenders.)
- a. Register with the Town
- b. Clearly spell out the rules with consequences

I would very much like to continue to hear your feedback on these ideas and other ideas that may not be included here. We are our very best as a Town when we have an open dialog with the spirit of compromise. #### STAY IN TOUCH WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

The year started off with the Carnival being a huge success, the Farmers' Market is going strong with new vendors being brought in, the Schools and Education Advisory Board with Flocking and all their other great events and Rolling Oaks Civic Association with the Town Easter Egg Hunt just to mention a few.

Our new trash collection company is doing a good job. The bulk trash pickup needed a few tweaks to get all the bugs out and things are running smoothly now.

The two mobile speed trailers are being moved, randomly around town, because we are not receiving enough input from the residents as to where they feel the trouble spots are. # Council Member David S. Kuczenski

Howdy Ranchers,

With July we celebrate our Republic's independence, which is my

favorite holiday. This national holiday always brings the excitement of fireworks. Please be safe and be aware of your neighbors' peace of mind when it comes to using fireworks. On one hand, some of our neighbors who served in the military now suffer from PTSD from their service, while on the other hand many animals experience anxiety from the loud noises associated with large fireworks. Over the years, I have been sent photographs of horses who were so fearful from the loud fireworks that they sustained fatal injuries. The only days the state allows fireworks are July 4th. December 31st and January 1st. Our Town Council is considering an ordinance that makes it a code violation for using fireworks on any day other than the state approved days. From the equestrian perspective, owners or stable hands must administer one of a few different medications to calm their horses. The medications often used to calm horses include trazadone. acepromazine or sedavet. Trazadone pills usually need time to build up in the system, and this medication takes several hours for the calming medication to take effect. With acepromazine or sedavet, the reaction time is usually shorter but must be administered long before the loud noises begin. Additionally, these medications must be administered in the stall or in a quiet environment to have the maximum effect. Finally, if the horse is already scared, none of these calming medications will work. The horse(s) will be terrified from the loud booms. This is why just allowing fireworks at any time presents a problem in our Town.

Lastly, it has come to the attention of the Council and many residents of our Town that Broward County is proposing to construct a solid waste incinerator on Sheridan Street in Pembroke Pines, and less than a few miles from homes within Southwest Ranches. The concept being proffered by Broward County is

for the entire county to send their solid waste to this one location, which is presently used as a landfill. This incinerator is by no means an issue being suggested by the Council, and as I have been advised, it is a serious concern for many residents. A large incinerator at this location will cause significant changes to the area. I feel it will be one of the biggest issues affecting our Town to date. Concerns expressed from residents include but are not limited to, increased traffic from every garbage truck in the County travelling upon either Sheridan Street or the already severely congested Griffin Road, the loud noise from the incinerator operating 24 hours a day, light pollution affecting nearly properties, ash emanating from the smoke stack(s) covering everything for miles around the smoke stack(s), and last but certainly not the least, many residents have expressed apprehension concerning chemical contamination of our surface and/or drinking waters. For most residents, our drinking water comes from wells that tap into either the Biscayne aguifer or the much deeper Floridian aquifer. Many years ago, Sunshine Ranches residents experienced chemically contaminated drinking water from the Vista View landfill, just north of Griffin Road at SW 148th Street. Some residents were forced to connect to municipal water because the ground water is contaminated from seepage from the old landfill. These memories do not fade away. Be assured that I will follow this issue very closely, discuss these concerns during Council meetings and if any decisions on this issue calls for a vote of the Council, I will put a great deal of weight behind the concerns of affected residents.

As your Town Council Member, I aim to preserve Southwest Ranches' unique rural lifestyle and minimize any changes to it. Together, let's protect and maintain what makes our community special. I also strive to return all phone calls within 24 to 48 hours. If you have questions or concerns, do not hesitate to contact me. #### APPROPRIATIONS FOR DISTRICT 103 ON THE GOVERNOR'S DESK



This session, we passed the largest budget in Florida's history - \$117 billion. I am proud that four of my sponsored appropriation projects were included in the budget and are awaiting the Governor's approvals.

Southwest Ranches will receive **\$340,200** to construct a stormwater conveyance system. Stormwater runoff floods the SW 185th Way and SW 57th Court right-of-way. This leads to a large area of standing water through which many vehicles cannot safely drive. This will improve the level of service of the roadway.

The South Broward Drainage District (SBDD) will receive \$262,500. The funds requested here will be used for the SBDD to rehabilitate three, large drainage culverts - so large that you can drive a truck through them. These culverts are critical infrastructure to convey all of the stormwater runoff for a 4160-acre drainage basin affecting thousands of homes and businesses in the cities of Hollywood, Pembroke Pines, Miramar, and parts of Davie and Southwest Ranches. If they failed, the results would be catastrophic.

The Dellenbach Foundation will receive **\$50,000**. They provide critical financial aid, essential supplies, and volunteer services to Veterans, First Responders, and sick and injured children. These individuals are struggling with homelessness, substance abuse, and a range of mental and physical challenges. This money will be used directly for services to those in need.

The Weston Music Society will receive **\$12,000**. The Weston Music Society will hold assemblies featuring professional musicians to promote appreciation of the field of music. Sub-grants will be provided to the music programs of Weston secondary schools to cover costs not funded in full by funds provided by the local school districts for band programs, uniforms, instruments, travel, and other music program and music student expenses. This will help families

who are facing financial hardships and are unable to secure the funds necessary to participate fully in a band program.

**CS/HB 881, My Safe Florida Home Program,** also passed this Legislative Session. This program provides grant money to **Florida homeowners** to retrofit their single-family homes and make them less vulnerable to hurricane damage. The bill increases the overall grant award for recipients from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Some of these improvements include:

#### **Roofs & Structure:**

- Reinforce roof-to-wall connections
- · Install secondary water resistance for the roof
- Upgrade roof covering
- Improve the strength of roof deck attachments

#### **Openings:**

- · Exterior door upgrades
- Garage door upgrades
- · Window upgrades

# **CREATING POLLINATOR POTS**

Protect their lives. Preserve ours.

Landscaping with Florida's native wildflowers and plants provides refuge for birds, bees and butterflies while creating "habitat highways" through urban settings. The insects which pollinate our food crops and natural areas are in steep decline. Our suburban landscapes are more important than ever in supporting them. Even slight changes in your landscape and neighborhood can help build native, natural corridors which provide food, nesting, and other resources for insect pollinators. No place for a garden? No problem! You can create a small oasis for pollinator insects planting pots with Florida's native wildflowers.

#### Easy and fun!

Starting your own pollinator pot is an easy and fun way to provide a stopover for local pollinators while helping to "connect the dots" to nearby wildflowers and natural areas. Your pots can be seasonal or may offer year-round benefits through plants that bloom at various times. When you use Florida's native wildflowers, your pollinator pot will attract a variety of insects, including butterflies, native and honeybees, flies, and beetles. When they feed on a flower's nec-

tar, they inadvertently pick up pollen on their legs and body parts. As they visit new areas, this pollen will be distributed to other plants of the same species to complete the pollination process, resulting in seeds and fruit.

#### **GETTING STARTED**

#### **Container selection**

Use a variety of pot sizes, from one gallon to 5 to 7 gallons. Drainage in container gardens is especially important to order to avoid plant root rot, so look for pots with a large hole in the bottom or five to seven smaller holes. Look for pots that have saucers or purchase them separately to place under pots to catch runoff and extend soil moisture. If you plan to grow moisture-loving species, choose pots with limited drainage.

# Site selection Plan to group your pollinator pots to create a visual "hotspot" that is easily seen by potential insect visitors. Sunny pollinator gardens need four to six hours of direct or indirect light daily. Shady pollinator gardens also can attract pollinators, but plants will bloom best if they get two to three hours of filtered sunlight.

Soil

Use potting soil made with crushed pine bark and peat or media designed for vegetable grow boxes. A light mulching of pine straw or leaves can help the soil retain moisture. Fill the pot with soil then water to saturate it before planting.

#### Plant selection

A complete pollinator garden will provide blooming wildflowers in spring, summer, and fall, so plan to mix plants in large pots or use a single species per separate pot for each season. If mixing plants in large pots, it is important to choose plants with similar moisture needs. Select three to five species of varying heights for large pots. You also can add low-growing groundcovers, grasses, or a vine. Consult your local native plant nursery for wildflowers which grow well in pots throughout Florida.

#### Maintenance

Potted plants dry out faster than in-ground plantings, so give pots a good watering once or twice a week as needed. Larger pots may need less-frequent watering. As your potted garden matures, it will go through natural cycles. After flowers mature and seed sets, perennials can be cut to their base for regrowth or replaced with fresh plants. Promote repeated flowering by deadheading flowers. Trim sparse plants to increase new leaf growth. Wildflowers in nature and inground gardens do not require fertilizer, but a low concentration of a balanced liquid or solid fertilizer can be applied if your pollinator pot plants appear undernourished.

# PROTOTYPE BARN

In furtherance of the Town's goal of preserving its rural lifestyle, the Town Council has given residents a simpler mechanism to build a barn that is in compliance with Florida statutory requirements. As such, the Town contracted with an architect who agreed to create a prototype barn drawing, in compliance with the Florida Buil

compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be permitted for residents throughout the Town. The plans are for a three stall barn with a tack room.

A Town resident looking to build a barn can simply purchase a pre-drafted architectural plan from the Town, which they then can submit, at a reduced cost, and on an expedited basis, to get a permitted barn that will be in compliance with both state and local regulations.

#### "HOW TO DO BUSINESS WITH THE TOWN"

The Town welcomes participation from all vendors qualified to do business with the Town.

- Do not walk through flowing water. If you must walk in standing water, use a pole or stick to ensure the depth of the water ahead.
- Do not drive through a flooded area. Do not drive around road barriers; the road may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Electrical current travels through water. If possible, report downed powerlines to FPL. Do not use appliances or motors that are wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their habitat may take shelter in your home.
- Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors can be covered with debris. Surfaces that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.
- **Be alert for gas leaks.** If your house is serviced by gas, do not smoke, use candles or open flames unless you know the gas has not built up. Make arrangements to turn off your electricity and gas.

#### **Financial Assistance Advice**

If your home or business is damaged by a flood, you may be required to meet certain building requirements to reduce further flood damage by coming into compliance with local, state, and federal criteria. To help with these

costs, financial assistance such as grants, loans, rebates and the NFIP's Increased Cost of Compliance Coverage may be available.

#### **National Flood Insurance Program Changes**

In accordance with 2014 Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is continuing to gradually phase out flood insurance premium subsidies on certain policyholders. The

changes have and will have the greatest impact on properties located within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) that were built prior to the adoption of Broward County's first FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) on October 26, 1972, or prior to December 31, 1974, without elevation certificate information. #### **Get a Flood Insurance Policy**

Replacing household contents damaged by floods could place a significant financial burden on a homeowner or renter without flood insurance. Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.

Homeowner's insurance policies do not generally cover damage from floods. However, because the Town of Southwest Ranches participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy from an insurance agent and benefit from the premium discount available to all Southwest Ranches residents. Flood insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that have been flooded previously. Please note that unless there is a special condition of the mortgage, there normally is a 30-day waiting period between the time flood insurance is purchased and the time coverage is in force. Though all home and business owners in these areas with mortgages from federally regulated or insured lenders are required to buy flood insurance, all residents should consider flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses.

If your property is in the SFHA and you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or insured lender, flood insurance is required. Even if you do not have a mortgage and you live in the SFHA or you live outside of the SFHA, all property owners and renters should carefully consider the benefits of flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses from floods. #### Water Quality and Flood Control Effects of **Drainage Systems**

The success of the drainage system in your neighborhood depends on proper maintenance of the system. The swales that are commonly located between your yard and street are part of the neighborhood's storm water management system.

Gutters, storm drain pipes, lakes, wetlands, swales and canals should be kept free of debris. It is against Town Code to dump trash in waters. The drainage system may provide both water quality and flood control benefits, Lakes, wetlands, swales and canals filter pollutants from runoff or allow pollutants to settle out. Check with the Town's Engineering Department before paving, regrading or altering swales.



#### **Protect Property from Flooding**

Losses due to floods can be reduced by implementing property protection measures. Furniture, appliances, clothing, and other movable items can be elevated within the structure or relocated away from potential flooding if time permits. You should also make an itemized inventory of your belongings including costs, dates of purchase and serial numbers.

There are several ways to protect a building from flood damage if feasible. One way is to make sure your lot is graded in a manner that will direct runoff away from your building. Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended if water will rise to a depth of two feet or greater. A third approach is to raise the house above flood levels. Prior to making these modifications, consult with a certified contractor.



#### **Build Responsibly**

Strict regulations govern substantial improvements to structures in the flood plain. According to NFIP, "substantial improvement" means the cost of any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either before the improvement is started or if the structure has been damaged and is being restored.

Please be advised that any new development or improvement on a property will be subject to current Town regulations and may also be subject to state and federal regulations. Please contact the Southwest Ranches Building Code Services Division at (954) 434-0008 for specific information and to report unpermitted construction activities.



#### Flood Risk Specialist Available to Assist Residents

The Town of Southwest Ranches wants to ensure that residents who have questions about flood risks, flood insurance, and retrofitting techniques, get answers in a timely manner. The Town Engineer is available to assist in the following areas:

1) Flood Insurance; 2) Flood Zone interpretation including base flood elevation and/or flood depth; 3) Additional FIRM information; 4) Problems not shown on FIRM; 5) Special flood related hazards; 6) Historical flood-related data; 7) Natural floodplain functions; and 8) Property protection measures. and ask to speak to the Town Engineer. You may also schedule a site visit to review flooding, drainage, and storm sewer problems, and to obtain advice on retrofitting techniques to provide additional protection. #### **Local Flood Hazards**



Floods resulting from prolonged, heavy rainfall can occur in rivers and canals that drain inland areas into the Atlantic Ocean when waterway capacities are exceeded. Flooding from heavy rainfall occurs in low-lying areas and areas near rivers and canals.

The severe flooding that occurred as a result of the exceedingly wet summers and the hurricanes of 1947 was the basis for creating what is now the South Florida Water Management District. South Florida's five-month rainy season brings more than two-thirds of the region's annual rainfall. The rainy season can also bring flooding, which may occur when large amounts of rain fall over a short period of time or from a single heavy storm, tropical system or hurricane.



Since portions of Southwest Ranches have been designated as a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), it is advisable to check the interactive map viewer to see the location of your property with respect to the SFHA. Visit http://southwestranches. org/departments/town-engineering/flood-insurance-information/ and se-

lect Flood Maps. You can also call (954) 434-0008, provide your address and zip code, and Town staff will assist you in determining SFHA information specific to your property.

#### **Protect Natural Floodplain Functions**

Although much of the natural flood plain system in South Florida has been altered and is frequently over-drained, efforts are being made to enhance many historical wetlands and canals to restore them to a more natural state. These flood plain and wetland areas buffer flood flows, remove pollutants from our surface waters, recharge groundwater and create diverse habitat systems for plants and animals. The Southwest Ranches Comprehensive Plan includes policies pertaining to flood plains and wetlands. The plan provides for protection and creation of surface waters, protection and wetlands preservation.



#### **Map Services**

Maps are an effective method of communicating information about flood hazards. Residents and businesses that are aware of potential flood hazards can take steps to avoid problems and reduce exposure to flooding. Therefore, the Town offers

complementary maps to supplement and clarify the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with information on additional hazards, flooding outside mapped areas, development regulations that affect floodplain properties, flood insurance, natural floodplain functions, and property protection measures.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes information you will need for a flood insurance policy including whether your property is in a SFHA, the community number, panel number and suffix, FIRM date, FIRM zone, base flood elevation and the elevation datum used. Additional FIRM information is also available showing areas of concern such as whether your property is located within a floodway.

The Town has mapped local drainage problem areas within the Town. In addition, the Town has a map providing information about past floods that have occurred. If you live in one of these areas, we would like to have a discussion with you regarding potential remedies.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes layers related to natural floodplain functions, specifically wetlands and fish and wildlife habitat. The map includes Broward County's wetland data to provide a comprehensive picture of where wetlands are located within the Town.

#### Veterans with a Service-Connected Disability

Veterans with a service-connected disability rating of 10% - 99%, or their surviving spouse, are eligible to receive a \$5,000 exemption on their homesteaded property's assessed value. Florida law also provides a full exemption for veterans with a 100% service-connected disability rating or the veteran's surviving spouse.

If your service-connected disability rating has increased to 100% since you initially filed for your Veteran's Exemption, please provide our office with a certificate indicating your 100% service-connected disability rating from the US Government or US Department of Veterans. You can email a copy of this certificate to <a href="mailto:exemptions@bcpa.net">exemptions@bcpa.net</a>. The deadline to file for all 2023 exemptions is September 18, 2023.

Property owners who need proof of residency for school applications or proof of Homestead Exemption can easily print a copy of their property record directly from our website. Simply visit our website at <a href="https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/Record-Search">https://web.bcpa.net/bcpaclient/#/Record-Search</a>. Search for your home by name or address. Once you find your property record, you can print or save the property record page as a PDF (last icon on the tool bar).

Property owners who would like to view sales in their subdivision can click on the "Map" icon. An aerial view of the property will appear and a layer list box on the left side enables you to click on the "No Sales" drop down box to select sales you would like to view. Any sales you select will then populate on the aerial map. You can also view this information in the "Recent Sales in this Subdivision" section on the property record page (click on "More Sales" to view additional sales in your subdivision).






