## CONSTRUCTION AT DYKES AND GRIFFIN

I have heard from a number of residents with questions related to what is being constructed at the southwest corner of Dykes and Griffin Road. So, I want to answer some of those questions and provide a little background.

That portion of the property was purchased with the assistance of grant money shortly after the Town was incorporated. Basically, this was done to first preserve open space but second to provide places where residents could gather and enjoy that open space. So, to further that objective, plans were drawn up for each of our parks. As time has moved on, and funding has become available, each of our parks has progressed along those plans.

For the "Southwest Meadows Sanctuary", the park and the Southwest corner of Dykes and Griffin, these plans include facilities that would complement the use of the park. So, just as we have restroom facilities at the Equestrian Park, the Country Estates Fishing Hole Park, and the Rolling Oaks Barn, we are now constructing restroom facilities at this park. Also, there will be a covered area with benches and picnic tables that can be used for events as well.

As part of this work, we are also stabilizing the surrounding areas that can be used for parking. There are some areas that have been designated as wetlands, and we are not touching those areas. However, by stabilizing the rest, this will facilitate using this area for



parking even in wet weather, while still allowing the grass to return and keep this area green once the project is completed.

We did recognize that there were significant questions and misinformation regarding this project. So, to help get the word out, we have recently erected two signs on the property that help explain the project. This, along with additional help in communication in the upcoming budget, should help us to communicate better not only on this project but on other projects and events in the future.

We are hoping that this project can be completed by the end of the year. However, some of that depends on weather and the time it takes to get other outside governmental approvals. But I am excited to see this project move forward as we will be able to do many more events on this property once it is in place.

As always, thank-you for your trust and support in allowing me to serve as your Mayor.

## WINGS OVER THE RANCHES: BIRDING TOURS TAKE FLIGHT IN SOUTHWEST RANCHES

"Where Nature Takes Flight — Right in Your Backyard"



Southwest Ranches is known for its open spaces, equestrian trails, and commitment to preserving a rural lifestyle—but it's also a hidden gem for birding enthusiasts. This season, the Town is proud to launch Wings Over the Ranches, a new guided birding tour series that invites residents to explore the skies and sawgrass alongside professional Audubon birding guide Bob Hartmann.

With the theme "Where Nature Takes Flight—Right in Your Backyard," this initiative warmly celebrates the incredible wildlife that is beautifully woven into the everyday landscape around our community. Whether you're a seasoned birder or simply curious about the feathered neighbors in your own backyard, these tours are designed to inspire, educate, and connect.

## Why Birding in Southwest Ranches?

Our parks sit on the edge of the Florida Everglades, one of the most biodiverse ecosystems in North America. This unique location makes Southwest Ranches a seasonal corridor for migratory birds and a

year-round home for native species. Participants will have the chance to spot:

- Swallow-tailed kites gliding effortlessly with their forked tails
- Great egrets and blue herons wading gracefully through sawgrass
- Eagles, warblers, hawks, and other migratory visitors, depending on the season

Each tour is designed to highlight the ecological richness of our parks while fostering a deeper appreciation for conservation and habitat stewardship.

#### **Meet Your Guide: Bob Hartmann**

Vice Mayor Bob Hartmann is a seasoned Audubon birding expert with decades of experience leading tours across Florida's wetlands. Known for his engaging style and encyclopedic knowledge of bird behavior and our wild habitat, Bob blends storytelling, science, and humor to make every walk memorable.

"Birding isn't just looking—it's listening, learning, and loving the land," says Hartmann. "Every bird has a story. I just help you hear it."

Bob's nature tours welcome enthusiasts of all skill levels, offering expert guidance on bird identification, vocalizations, and wildlife photography. Along the way, he'll share fascinating insights into the Everglades ecosystem and highlight practical ways residents can contribute to local conservation efforts. Each tour spans a variety of park terrains—from walkways to marsh trails—so be sure to wear sturdy footwear and don't forget the bug spray!






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

## WELL CHECK PRE-REGISTRATION INFORMATION

## Only Rain Water Goes into the Storm Drains

Clean water begins in our own yards where the flow of rainwater begins its journey to the coastal waters of the Atlantic Ocean. Harmful substances (leaking oil from your car or fertilizers, herbicides, insecticides and pesticides that you use on your lawn) enter our ponds, lakes, canals and the ocean every time it rains — which is a lot here in Broward County. So let's all be good stewards of the environment and protect our water.

Your neighborhood drainage system is not a garbage disposal - don't treat it like one. Demonstrate your responsibility and dispose of chemicals, fertilizer, oil, etc. at our household hazardous waste collection . (see the town newsletter for dates or call Town Hall (954) 434-0008.)

Here in South Florida, water is everywhere - the Everglades; miles of beaches; heavy rains in the summer. But have you ever considered what happens to stormwater when it rains? Do you know how the rain that falls on your yard and in your neighborhood is carry away? Where does it go and how does it get there?

Broward County is one of 16 counties within the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD.) More than 2,100 miles of canals and levees, water control structures and pump stations make up this regional water management system — one of the largest in the world. This regional system conveys excess water into storage areas or out to the ocean.

The SFWMD operates the regional flood control system: 2,100 miles of canals, 2,000 m In Florida's natural environment, rain can fall onto vegetated land and slowly filter down into the soil. Eventually, this water reaches the water table and can make its way into our groundwater supplies. This is how rain is treated by the natural process and eventually recharges our drinking water supplies.

Rain that falls on hard and impervious surfaces can't seep into the ground and, instead, runs off into surface waters or onto nearby lands. This rainfall, or stormwater, runoff carries pollutants and contaminants, such as oil, heavy metals, pesticides and fertilizers into our waterways. Additionally, stormwater runoff that can't percolate down into the ground increases the likelihood of flooding, redirects potential drinking water into local waterways, and can cause loss of habitat due to erosion.

Homeowners can take simple measures to reduce the quantity and improve the quality of stormwater runoff from their properties. Swale areas separating sidewalks from roads should be maintained with a soft contour, allowing the collection of runoff from the property. Water collected in the swale is then provided water quality treatment as it slowly percolates through the soil and recharges the aquifer. Walkways created with mulch and pavers, in lieu of pavement,

will also reduce runoff and promote aquifer recharge.

#### Stormwater

Stormwater management is an integral part of everyday life in Broward County ... even when it's not raining. With abundant rainfall and a relatively flat landscape, the infrastructure required for the treatment, storage and management of stormwater runoff is all around us — from neighborhood swales and ponds to lakes and canals. This infrastructure is a necessary facet of the landscape, which has traditionally been designed for the sole purpose of moving and treating stormwater.

As Broward has become built-out, urban densification and redevelopment activities have made innovative strategies to providing stormwater management increasingly necessary. These new approaches, often referred to as green techniques, help mimic natural processes and integrate stormwater management within the landscape to create multi-functional site designs.

These green technologies divert stormwater from traditional storm sewer systems to areas where it can be absorbed and treated by the soil and native vegetation. Designed to retain and treat water on site, these green technologies create water resource benefits that include enhanced aquifer recharge and stormwater recycling.

Rain gardens help capture and store rainwater. These planted depressions absorb rainwater from impervious surfaces, such as roofs, driveways, walkways and turf areas. Once captured, the stormwater slowly seeps into the ground, instead of flowing into storm drains and surface waters. Some rain gardens reduce pollution flow into waterways by as much as 30 percent.

Rain barrels can also be used to capture and store rainwater. These barrels are positioned at the bottom of rain gutter downspouts to capture rainwater from a home's roof. The water is then stored for later outdoor use, such as irrigation, car washing or hand watering of plants.

Incorporating native plants into your landscape is an important strategy for improving stormwater management, as well. Native plant beds create a natural environment in which rainwater can percolate down into the ground or slowly move into a water harvesting area, such as a rain garden or pond. Native plants are also specially adapted to Florida's wet and dry seasons so they use less water, require less fertilizer, and provide habitat for native wildlife.

#### SFlorida Strengthens Protections **Against Digital Abuse**

This year, Florida passed several important new laws to strengthen protections for victims of online harassment.

HB 1451 - Sexual Cyberharassment makes it easier to prosecute people who share private, sexually explicit photos or videos without consent.

Before, prosecutors had to prove that the person who shared the images meant to cause emotional distress. Now, simply sharing this type of content without permission is enough to face serious charges. The law also covers situations where someone posts personal details, like a name or address, alongside the explicit content. It introduces harsher penalties when someone profits from this crime, making it a felony, and creates stronger consequences for repeat offenders. In addition, it extends the amount of time victims have to report violations of sexual cyberharassment, and gives them the right to sue offenders for damages in civil court.

HB 757 - Sexual Images - makes it a felony to create, request, or share fake sexual images, often known as deepfakes, without the person's consent. The law also expands protections for minors by increasing penalties for anyone who possesses, views, or distributes sexual images of children, and makes it a crime to solicit or request these images. Each image counts as a separate offense, allowing prosecutors to pursue stronger charges in serious cases. In addition to criminal penalties, victims whose likenesses are used in fake sexual images can now file a civil lawsuit against offenders to seek financial damages plus legal fees. October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

As a reminder, October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The Hope Card Program, which was launched at the end of 2024, allows survivors with active protective orders to request a wallet-sized card to carry with them. **Fort Lauderdale, Fla. - August 27, 2025** - The South Florida Wildlife Center (SFWC), Florida's largest wildlife rehabilitation facility, announced today it has reached an agreement to secure an 8-acre property in Southwest Ranches as the site for its future hospital and wildlife care

campus. For 56 years, SFWC's current

4.5-acre site has served as a vital resource for South Florida's wildlife and community, caring for nearly 8,000 animals yearly.

The new property, procured in partnership with the town of Southwest Ranches and the Broward County School Board, will allow the organization to move forward with plans to build a new state-of-the-art hospital and expand its programs. Construction for the new facility is expected to begin in 2026. The new campus will enable the organization to start reimagining the future of wildlife care and rehabilitation in the area. Some of the desired elements of the future facility include:

- A wildlife hospital with triage, surgery, labs, and specialized care units.
- Education spaces, including an auditorium and wildlife observation areas.
- Enhanced professional training capabilities for veterinary students, plus online programs for global rehabilitation centers.
- Infrastructure upgrades to parking, administrative facilities, and community engagement spaces.

"We have exciting goals for the new center," explained Jeffrey Arciniaco, president and chairman of the SWFC Board. "But we can't do it without the public's support and donations. We've done so much with our existing facility and are looking forward to expanding and doing even more for the community. With human-wildlife interactions continuing to increase, our work is more critical than ever." SFWC is launching a capital campaign to fund construction and program expansion. Because the organization is a 501(c)(3) and relies on donations, SFWC is asking the public to consider supporting the



campaign to develop the new facility that will continue to serve all of Broward County, while supporting Miami Dade and Palm Beach counties when needed. "We are truly grateful to the town of Southwest Ranches, the school board, and our donors for their vision and partnership," Arciniaco continued. "Together, we are creating a future where South Florida's wildlife will continue to have a place to heal and thrive."

If you applied and were approved for the Homestead Exemption for tax year 2026, this exemption will show online in December. Once approved, Homestead Exemption automatically renews each year provided there is no change in the ownership or use of the property. You do not need to reapply for this exemption if the property remains your permanent residence.

#### Did You Acquire or Take Ownership of Your Property in 2025?

If you acquired your home in 2025, the TRIM (proposed tax) Notice you received in August reflected the previous owner's exemption status which will be removed at the end of this year. If this property is your permanent residence and you believe you qualify for a 2026 Homestead Exemption, you must complete an application in your name. To be eligible for 2026 Homestead Exemption, an applicant must both own and make the property their permanent residence as of January 1, 2026.

Please note: "permanent residency" does not require physical occupancy of the property. If you are building or intend to build a home to be used as your permanent residence, please call our Customer Service Department at 954.357.6830 to discuss Homestead Exemption eligibility requirements.

Homestead Exemption does not automatically transfer from one property to another. You can easily apply for Homestead Exemption and any other tax-saving exemptions online at https://web.bcpa.net under the "Exemptions & Classifications" tab. If you previously owned another Homesteaded property within the past three tax years, you will also be applying for portability. The portability application is part of the online Homestead Exemption application.







